   Analysis, Response, and Assessment






### **Brief History of the CSSAC**

### Psychological Emergency Response Team (PERT)



- PERT seeks to de-escalate a mental health emergency and, when possible, redirect the individual to mental health services instead of hospitalization or incarceration. (Modeled after San Diego County PERT)
- PERT clinicians create a holistic and informed response, alongside UC San Diego Police Officers, to mental health-related calls across our campus community.
- Current proposal to fund two clinicians who will respond with trained UCPD officers.

#### **Looking to the Future**


- How will UC policing change with PERT, transformational policing, and UCOP policies?
